1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Our parent Educational Institution, Shri Shivaji Education Society, Amravati is a premier educational institution of Central India with branches in all the districts of Vidarbha region in Maharashtra. It is established by late Dr. Panjabrao alias Bhausaheb Deshmukh, first Agriculture Minister of India and a member of Constitution Draft Committee. Primary and Secondary schools, Multi Faculty Junior and Senior colleges, Engineering, Medical and Agriculture Colleges with hostels and other teaching and technical institutions are run by the society.

Shri Shivaji College of Arts, Commerce and Science, Akola is established in 1963, which is situated in Western Vidarbha region of Maharashtra and affiliated to Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University, Amravati. The college is recognized by UGC under Section 2(f) & 12 (B) of the UGC Act 1956. Initially, faculties of Arts and Commerce were established and the faculty of Science was started in 1967. Since then our college has been imparting education in the faculties of Arts, Commerce, Science and Home Science at Graduation and Post-Graduation levels and Doctoral Research Programmes. It has competent and experienced staff in teaching departments, well equipped and recognized research laboratories, a computer department, rich central and departmental libraries supported by spacious reading rooms, beautiful campus, and girls' hostels, well developed botanical garden and playgrounds. It always attempted to provide quality education to the students who are coming from all walks of life. The college participated for NIRF and earned ISO 9002 Certification in 2020 for 3 years. College introduced some unique subjects such as Biochemistry, Forensic Science, Geoinformatics, Yogshastra and Psychology. We have 99 teaching faculties; out of them 67 faculties are Ph. D. and 63 non-teaching staff. NAAC has reaccredited our college with A grade in its 3rd cycle with CGPA 3.24. UGC has recognized our College as a "College with Potential for Excellence" in the second phase up to 2019. The College is also supported by DST for FIST. RUSA has provided financial support to establish Resource Centre for Inclusive Education. Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University, Amravati has recognized our college as a Lead College to guide and motivate nearby colleges for NAAC Accreditation.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Shri Shivaji College of Arts, Commerce and Science, Akola is affiliated to Sant Gadge Baba Amravati

University, Amravati. College has clearly defined its vision and mission statements that integrate the current education policy. The institution offers 4 U.G. programmes i.e. B.A., B.Com. B.Sc., B.Sc. (Home Sci.), 21 PG program i.e. M.A., M.Sc., M.Com, M.Sc. Home Science and 15 Ph.D. programmes in Humanities, Science and Technology, Interdisciplinary studies and Commerce and Management Faculties along with 20 Career Oriented certificate / Diploma /Add on Courses. Semester pattern is introduced in all programs.

College, in-tune with the university academic calendar, prepares annual academic calendar and keep adherence with it. For effective curriculum delivery and transaction, the college provides a strong support mechanism in the form of ICT and enriched library with online resources. Most of the programs provide experiential and participative learning through projects, internship, industrial visits, survey, educational tours, case study and continuous evaluation through seminars, workshops, group discussions, college tests and practicals.

The college has introduced 05 new subjects in P.G, and 04 new skill oriented courses after third accreditation. Twenty two (22) staff members worked on various academic bodies such as Board of Studies/ Academic Council of affiliating university. Most of the faculty members are involved in Question Papers Setting, Moderation, Assessment and Evaluation. The Board of Studies of the respective subjects revised and updated the syllabus periodically. While revision of the curriculum, the latest development in the subject and the feedback received from all the stakeholders are considered. Academic flexibility is provided through elective/ CBCS courses in undergraduate and post-graduation programs. Institute conducted internal/external academic audit and submitted its report to the College Development Committee for appropriate considerations. The curriculum takes care of overall development of the students. All cross cutting issues such as human values, professional ethics, gender sensitization and environment sustainability have been integrated in the curriculum. Stakeholder's feedback system is effectively implemented. Feedbacks are helpful for revision, redesign and to enhance learning effectiveness.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The admission process is online and transparent. It follows eligibility criteria of Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University, Amravati. The reservation policy of the government of Maharashtra is observed. Average percentage of enrolled students is 84.27 % in assessment period. Average percentage of seats filled against seats reserved for various categories of students is 88.37% in the assessment period.

At the beginning of academic session, the teaching departments assess learning levels of admitted students and identify advanced learners and slow learners. Then the teachers adopt appropriate teaching methods for them. Teachers use experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methods to enhance the learning experiences of students. For better comprehension of the subject, more emphasis is given on laboratory teaching, field and industrial visits, practical teaching. Apart from this, workshops and seminars are organized for the students. The college provided academic and infrastructural facilities to the students' i.e. a rich library, well equipped laboratories, internet, computers and other ICT tools which facilitate the learning to make it more students centric. Teachers have been extensively using ICT based tools and platforms for teaching, learning and evaluation process.

The college has 99 permanent faculty members, out of them 67 are Ph.D. Twenty-eight full time ad-hoc based faculty members are appointed in the academic session 2020-21. The mentor mentee ratio is 1::43 in the academic session 2020-21. The teachers have been constantly striving for individual and institutional excellence by keeping abreast of the knowledge updates, attending national and international conferences, seminars, workshops, orientation, refresher and short term training courses.

Being an affiliated college, evaluation of academic performance of the students is done by the college within the framework of the parent university. Programme and course outcomes of all programmes are communicated to students through website and discussed in the beginning of academic session. Evaluation of the students' academic performance is carried out through seminars, college internal assessment examination, university theory and practical examinations. Internal assessment examination committee of the college plans and implements the process of internal assessment. Average pass percentage of students is 76.30% in the assessment period.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college extends all possible help and encouragement to boost research activities in various departments by providing independent research laboratories/centres, library, internet facilities and necessary instrumentation. Promotional and developmental activities of research are maintained and monitored by the Principal, IQAC and RAC (Research Advisory Committee) of the college. The RAC and IQAC appeal the faculty members to apply for research grants to various funding agencies. It has been resulted in receiving a grant of Rs.57.05 Lakhs from various funding agencies for 03 Major and 10 Minor Research projects. 11 research projects are completed successfully in the assessment period. In the last five years, 66 research oriented events are conducted which include 02 international conferences, 03 national conferences, 04 literary meets, 04 IPR workshops and other regional, state and national level events. About 577 research papers are published in various reputed journals indexed in Web of Science, Scopus, UGC Care and other databases like Elsevier and Springer. The faculty members authored 123 book chapters in edited volumes and books published by various reputed publications. One patent is granted and two patents are published.

The college has 15 recognized research laboratories /centres, where 66 Ph. D. students are awarded Ph. D. degree. At present, 59 Ph. D. students have been working in various departments under the supervision of 38 Ph. D. supervisors who are recognized by parent university. The college has established a Central Instrumentation Cell (CIC) to provide the additional sophisticated instrumentation facilities to researchers which helps to boost the interdisciplinary research. Some of the departments have established linkages and MoUs with various national, regional agencies and firms for collaborative research. Various scientific and academic events are conducted for research promotion. The college has also set up an Entrepreneurship Cell to help in incubation purpose that encourages the creativity of students.

The college has a good number of extension activities conducted by various departments and support services such as NSS, NCC, Sports, Library and Study centres. It includes community development, communal harmony, environment, water conservation, health-hygiene and awareness programs. During last five years, the college has received 4 District and University level awards for the cleanliness awareness campaign and fieldwork in Swachh Bharat Abhiyan Mission. The students, who have been working in various sectors of community development are felicitated and awarded by various government and non-government organizations.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Infrastructural and Learning resources of the institution are well developed and maintained regularly. Physical facilities, like buildings, play grounds, hostels, canteen etc, help to run all the programmes smoothly. Master plan of institution exhibits optimum utilization of infrastructure.

The college has a land area of 7.02 acres and total built up area is 21,196.91 sq.mt, with G+2 floors and adequate parking facility. During last five years, college has constructed 551.63 sq.mt. on which Rs. 3,71,50,868/- is spent for construction and renovation. Central Instrumentation Cell, New Biochemistry Laboratory, Forensic Science Laboratory, Entrepreneurship Cell, College Main Gate, Commerce Seminar Hall, Boys Common Room, New Canteen, installation of Pavers are developed. For the security of students, the college campus is under CCTV surveillance. The fire safety system is also installed in all the buildings of the institution. To overcome the problem of power outage, the Generator and UPS are setup at various places. The use of Solar panels, LED lights helped to minimize the electricity consumption. The institution has 30 classrooms, 21 Under graduate and 13 Post Graduate laboratories, 09 research laboratories and 6 research centres, 01 A. V. hall, 14 Seminar halls, 01Auditorium, a Girls common rooms, a meeting hall, Library and Administration building.

The college has learning resources i.e. 317 Computers, 19 Laptops with internet facility, LCDs, OHPs, Scanner and Printers, Smart Boards, Visualizers in the various department, Office and library. The department of language has established a language laboratory in order to help students to improve their communication skill. The budget allocation has adequately been utilized for the maintenance and repair of infrastructure and laboratory equipments.

College has indoor and outdoor play grounds for various games. For some games, our institute hires sports grounds from other associations and government. We have gymnasium, Yoga centre, Health centre and Vasant Auditorium for all round development of students.

In library, there is a good collection of Books, Journals, Reference books and 86 subscribed journals on various subjects. Rs. 24 lakhs are spent for procuring the books and journals during the last five years. The institution has made provision of NLIST- INFLIBNET and DELNET facility with E-Books and E-Journals. The library is fully computerized with SOUL 3.0 and applications of barcode technology. The students have an access through OPAC (Online public Access Catalogue). College website www.shivajiakola,ac.in. is updated regularly, which provides current information to parents, students and also alumni. College campus is Wi-Fi enabled. The college has study centres of social reformers to provide value education to the students i.e. Mahatma Gandhi, Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar, Pt. Jawaharlal Nehru. The college has support facilities for students such as the Entrepreneurship Cell, Co-Operative Store and Bank of Maharashtra. The medical facilities are provided through Health Center. The special facilities are provided to differently-abled students. In addition to above, ornamental and medicinal plant garden, green house, vermicomposting unit and an eye catching landscape with a fountain at the statue of Dr. Panjabrao Deshmukh render a pleasant atmosphere for learning process. TALKING TREE app is installed to get technical information of plants in college campus.

Student Support and Progression

The college publishes prospectus and uploads on college website every year. 70.12 % student's avails scholarships and other financial assistance from the state and central governments. The college gives Institutional Scholarships to the students. Additionally, college supports the economically weaker students through Earn while Learn scheme and waived fees. The college encourages and develops entrepreneurial skills among the students through 20 career oriented courses and skill development programs.

The college conducts regular classes for NET, SET, and other competitive examinations through Career Guidance, Placement Cell and NET/SET coaching centre. In the last five years, 38 students have cleared NET/SET examination, and number of students have cleared other competitive examinations. The College

provided all sports and games facilities to the students and conducted University Level Sports and Games competitions. 376 students' bagged Awards/ Medals for their outstanding performance in sport/ cultural activities in last five years. The college organized Shivaji Olympiad and Shivotsav, sponsored by parent education society. Students participated in Chancellors events such as Youth festival, Indradhanu, Avhan , Ashvamegh and Avishkar. College provided financial support to students for participaton in sports and cultural events.

The students are made aware of discipline, rules and regulations to be observed. Anti Sexual Harassment Cell monitors sexual harassment at work place. Grievance Redressal Cell and Anti-Ragging Committee are constituted as per State Government and University directives. Career Guidance Committee and Placement Committee invited companies and arranged the campus placement for students. The institution is proud to have a registered Alumni Association comprising number of academicians, scientists, IAS Officer, Judges, Advocates, Bank Officers and industrialists as its members.

In the last five years, 115 under graduate and post graduate students secured merit position in the University examinations. The student success rate of the institution has been increasing every year. Students' progression rate in higher education is above 80%. Number of students are selected to represent our University in sports and games. The college has NSS and NCC Units for girls and boys. Along with its regular activities, the NSS unit conducts special camps for Tree Plantation, Cleanliness Drive, Water Conservation, Blood Donation, Digging of Lavatory Tanks, Congress Grass Eradication, Rehabilitation Campaign for Addicts etc. Students participated in the University Research festival- 'Avishkar'. Students bagged prizes in state and regional level Debate and Elocution competitions. Students actively participated in seminars, conferences and received research awards for paper and poster presentation. Student's representatives participated in various academic and administrative committees. The college has organized guest lectures of the Scientist from BARC, Mumbai and other eminent scientists to create a scientific temperament among the students and the society.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The Mission and Vision statements clearly reflect the distinctive characteristics of the institute. The executive members of the governing body, the principal and the faculty members have an active participation in College Development Committee (CDC), IQAC, College Council, Purchase Committee, Library Committee and UGC Interface Committee. Academic and Administrative performance of the college is reviewed and assessed through College Development Committee, IQAC and Shri Shivaji education society's Academic Audit Committee to strengthen the process of marching towards excellence. E-governance is implemented in all administrative and academic matters. The Institutional authority provided complete autonomy under the supervision of the Principal, faculty heads and heads of the department for planning and implementing the teaching –learning plans, research, extension work, academic and extracurricular activities. Autonomy is given to the departments to utilize the budget allocation as per their needs.

The college has a culture of participative management through decentralization of work. The college prepares a perspective plan for teaching-learning, research, extension, extracurricular and co-curricular activities. Internal organizational structure and decision making process is undertaken by CDC, IQAC, College Council and Heads of the Departments. The plan of quality improvement strategies is designed. The college has established student's feedback systems. After analysing the feedbacks, the suggestions are forwarded to the higher authority. The institutional authority encourages faculty members to participate in Faculty Development Programs (Online/ Offline). College organized 08 training programs for teaching and non-teaching staff during last five years. The college has various welfare schemes for teaching and non-teaching staff. Self-

performance appraisal forms are considered for faculty's assessment and career advancement. The financial budget is prepared and approved in CDC. Financial audit is conducted by internal and external agencies. Audited statements are prepared by Chartered Accountant. The IQAC is functional, having the members from management, teachers, students, non-teaching staff, external experts and alumni. The academic audit is conducted on regular basis. The data collection and compilation of all academic activities is a regular practice. IQAC, in collaboration with the management and various college departments, organizes various events for the benefits of students. During this assessment period, the IQAC focused on Research and Innovation and ICT facilities in the college.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Various initiatives are taken by the institution for the promotion of gender equity such as sensitization campaigns, training, workshops, programs etc.

A safe and secured environment is provided to all by providing CCTV surveillance, secured compound wall, hostel facility, common rooms and grievance committees for various issues.

The college has established an integrated sustainable waste management approach to minimise solid, liquid, biomedical, e-waste and hazardous chemicals. Water conservation facilities are also available in the institution. Use of renewable energy, water harvesting, check dam construction in the villages adopted by NSS unit, efforts for carbon neutrality, plantation and waste management are undertaken. Use of CFLs, LED lamps, wind operated ceiling coolers and other eco-friendly products with star rating minimized the power consumption. Quality audits on environment and energy are done from time to time. The college campus is green with lawns and Botanical garden. Efforts are taken to keep the campus green and clean by carrying out environmental promotion activities.

The institution has a barrier free environment by providing ramps, washrooms, assistive technology, human assistance, scribes and reading material for the differently abled. The institution promoted an attitude of tolerance and inclusiveness towards linguistic, cultural, communal and socioeconomic diversities. Every student is equally treated and the environment of tolerance and belief is maintained.

There are NSS, NCC units and Study Centres which undertake initiatives like voting awareness rally, cultural programmes, and celebration of birth anniversaries of visionary leaders. Value based programms are conducted to sensitize students and employees to the constitutional obligations. A Code of Conduct is prescribed for all. Various National and International days and events are celebrated in the institute with great enthusiasm in various ways.

Two Best Practices identified by the institute are Community Outreach and Entrepreneurship Cell.

The Community Outreach activities are aimed to gain field experience to broaden the perception of the world around the students. Some of the community outreach activities are conducted through Anganwadi Centers, National Nutrition Week, International Brest Feeding Week and Skill Demonstration Workshops. Swachha Bharat Abhiyan, activities promoting hygiene, raising funds for the needy patients, celebration of Diwali with tribes, Women's Day celebration are highly appreciable.

Another Best Practice – Entrepreneurship Cell is established with an objective to go beyond Earn while Learn' scheme and imparted innovation, entrepreneurial spirit and skills in students. An insight to use the available

resources and skills are developed.

Response:

The College is affiliated to Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University, Amravati and strictly follows curriculum designed by affiliating University. The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process to achieve academic excellence & professional competency by adopting academic flexibility measures.

Academic Planning

- At the beginning of academic year, the Principal with all head of the departments finalize academic calendar.
- Time-table is framed by respective committee according to the workload of each subject as per prescribed university guidelines.
- Heads of department conduct meeting with faculty members to finalize departmental time table, curricular and extracurricular activities and distribution of workload.
- An induction programme is conducted for the new batches of students to bridge the gap.
- Each faculty member strictly follows the time-table and prepares micro teaching plan and also maintains the academic record in the academic diary.
- Every subject teacher uses teaching-aids to make teaching effective through models, specimen and charts along with the use of digital class-room for effective teaching.
- Power-point presentations, soft and hard copies, CD's, website addresses are provided to the students to enhance their knowledge.
- Students maintain the record book of practical which are verified by concerned teacher.
- In the pandemic period, college switched over the curricular and co-curricular activities to online mode.
- Parent education society provided LMS (Bigblue Button) for curriculum delivery for online mode of teaching.
- Faculty members also use Google class room, Google meet, YouTube, and Zoom platform for lectures and internal assessment.
- The faculties gave demonstrations of the experiments virtually.
- Teachers are appointed in-charge of various aspects for effective curriculum planning and execution.
 - A dedicated in-charge teacher for a student group takes care of students regarding academic performance, scholarships, examinations and other problems.
 - Continuous monitoring of the students is a part of internal assessment.
 - Faculty members are available after class hours to clear the students' doubts.
 - Simplification of curriculum delivery through teaching outside the classroom.
 - Industrial visits to understand production, technical and manufacturing processes.
- Program outcome and course outcome are well defined and disseminated to all the stakeholders

through websites. Progress of the syllabus and curriculum delivery is reviewed from time to time.

- Guest lectures of eminent academicians and industrialists are organized on current trends related to curriculum.
- The collected and analyzed feedback on curricula is communicated to University for upgrading purpose. Many teachers are involved in revision of curriculum as a member of university academic bodies e.g. BOS, Academic Council, RRC etc.

Response

The Institution strictly follows Academic calendar of SGB Amravati University, Amravati. The academic calendar serves as an informational tool to plan the academic activities for students, faculty and staff of the institution. The academic calendar is well disseminated on the website, college prospectus, so as other stakeholders are informed regarding the activities and events happening in the institution. The calendar includes important dates such as dates for admission, the commencement of classes, workshops, seminars, practical exams, Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE), and University Exam.

Continuous Internal Evaluation Process:

The continuous internal evaluation of students is carried out through class test, home assignment, seminar, group discussion, field projects and excursion, industrial visit, visit to educational institution and research organization etc.

The College has an internal assessment examination committee to oversee the conduct of the internal assessment tests. Test dates are announced one week in advance by the Coordinator to the individual departments. Time tables are displayed on the department notice boards, institutional website, google classrooms and through whatsapp student groups. The syllabus for Internal Assessment is announced a

week in advance by the concerned subject teachers. Faculty set the question paper by considering university syllabus and university examination pattern. Question papers are submitted to Internal Assessment Examination Committee one day before the commencement of the internal assessment test.

The committee conducts the exams in specific answer booklets, distributed to the departments on the date of the examination. The answer papers are evaluated and remarked. The remarks on the evaluated answer sheets help students in analyzing their mistakes and improve upon their performances. The marks are announced and displayed on the departmental notice boards.

Apart from written tests, students are also given opportunities to deliver seminars, write assignments, group discussions, projects to broaden their skills.

After continuous internal evaluation, slow and advance learning students are identified in each class. The remedial classes are conducted for slow learners. The advance learners are provided with books and inspired to participate in seminars and other academic activities organized by university and institutions; like Avishkar, project competitions, seminar competition, Quiz competition, software development, etc. to raise their academic performance and skills.

Departments prepare a consolidated Internal Assessment mark lists and display on the notice board.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics ,Gender, Human Values ,Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

Response:

The college integrated cross cutting issues relevant to Gender, Environment and Sustainability, Human Values and Professional Ethics into curriculum. The syllabuses of Science, Humanities, Home Science and Commerce have all the above said topics in its curriculum. Chapters related to Professional Ethics are prescribed in the subjects Commerce and Management. Gender Equity issue is covered in the subject of Humanities. Human Values are taught in the subject of Humanities and Social sciences. Environment and Sustainability is covered in the subject Environment Science and the subject of Life Sciences. The students are taught these issues with equal vigour along with other contents.

Apart from the regular teaching on these issues, the college has other mechanisms to address them which support the teaching of content of the syllabi. After admissions, gender audit is carried out every year. On an average, the college has almost equal male-female student ratio. "Vishakha" a committee is dedicated for welfare of women, which works effectively to look into the issues of harassment of girls and female staff, if any. The health awareness programmes are carried out every year in college. Biochemistry and Microbiology departments conducted hemoglobin tests and blood group check-up of girl students. Suitable diet plans are suggested to them. To boost the confidence of girl students, women working in various fields from Akola are felicitated on Women's Day. Such programs sensitize the students about the gender issues taught in the syllabus. Workshop on 'Awareness and Training on Sudden Cardiac Arrest' by department of Biochemistry in collaboration with Sath Sevak Foundation and iCARE was also organized.

In fourth semester of all faculties, Environmental Studies is a compulsory subject, in which the students get detailed information on the issue of Environment. To give a participatory learning experience, the institute conducted various programmes to let student to be aware of the sustainability of the environment. Every year, "Forest Conservation Day" is celebrated on 23rd July to make students aware about conservation and protection of forest and its ecological importance. Ozone Day is celebrated on 16th September every year. "Wildlife Conservation Week" is observed from 1st October to 7th October every year. At the same time, the college follows it practically and has a "Green Campus". We also have a solar unit installed in college that saves energy as well as money and man power.

As a part of inculcating human values among the students, the students are given information through various platforms and programmes. N.S.S. and N.C.C units helps the students to understand the importance of the need of community. These two units help students to develop character, discipline, leadership and secular outlook. "National Yoga Day" is celebrated every year on 21st June. On 26th September 2018 an "Awareness on Prevention of diseases" programme was conducted. Along with this "Women Empowerment Workshop" was conducted at Goregaon Khurd, in which various issues about women empowerment were addressed. Almost all departments work on sensitization of various social issues. The Entrepreneurship Cell is of immense help in providing students the professional skills and a platform to explore their creativity. All thes platforms are add-on facilities to understand and aquire knowledge about the issues addressed in the curricullum.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

The institute assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special programmes for advanced learners and slow learners.

The Institute identifies slow learners and advanced learners by considering the four different criteria in the academic year.

- 1. Academic Performance of the students of previous board / university examination is considered.
- 2. Interaction with the students in introductory session and during Orientation Programme & Bridge Courses.
- 3. Internal Exams, Class Tests, Seminars, Group Discussion, Projects are considered.
- 4. Performance of the students in Question Answer Session, Tutorials and Practical's are also considered.

At the beginning of Academic year, Bridge Courses are conducted for the newly admitted students to acquaint them with program and courses. A systematic evaluation process consisting of Class Tests, Seminars, Group Discussion & Class Performance is followed to assess the learning level of students.

Activities for Slow Learners:

- 1. Academically Slow Learners are given individual attention in the classroom.
- 2. Special guidance is given to boost up their confidence level required to reach desired academic goal.
- 3. Remedial coaching is provided to Slow Learners to make their concepts clear.
- 4. Individual academic counselling, problem solving sessions and revision sessions are also conducted.
- 5. Special English Language coaching classes are conducted for students who are deficient in language skills.
- 6. Evaluation of slow learner students is reviewed after each semester to ensure improvement in their performance.
- 7. To enhance their confidence level, departments conduct activities like personality development, soft skill development workshops.
- 8. Guardian Teacher talks with their parents to make the interaction more effective and result oriented through Student Teacher Guardian Scheme.
- 9. Study material and question bank are provided for revision and preparation of university exam.
- 10. Conducive environment is given to improve their pace in learning.

Activities for Advanced Learners:

1. Participatory & innovative teaching learning process is implemented for advanced learners.

- 2. Special guidance is provided to these students to participate in various competitions such as i.e. ChemiQuiz competition, project competition, debate competition etc.
- 3. Advanced learners are motivated to participate in national & international conferences, seminars.
- 4. Students having research inclination are guided to undertake research projects and motivated to participate in research activities like AVISHKAR, a research convention and research publication.
- 5. Students are motivated to appear for competitive examinations such as NET/SET/GATE/Staff Selection/Banking/ MPSC.
- 6. Students are guided for effective use of library resources i.e. NLIST, DELNET, Ebooks, E-Journals.
- 7. Reference books are provided from departmental library.
- 8. Mentors motivate the students to use YouTube Videos and Swayam-NPTEL learning materials.
- 9. Students are encouraged to access latest online Journals, reference materials which help them to cope up with the emerging trends in their field of study.
- 10. Meritorious students' are felicitated by providing Teachers Sponsored Scholarships, Certificate of Appreciation.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

In addition to traditional teaching-learning methods like lectures and practical, the institute implemented student centric methods such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies for enhancing the learning experience. These methodologies include illustration, special lectures, seminars, group discussion, field studies, case-studies, project-based-methods, experimental methods.

Experiential learning: - Practical classes are conducted in the laboratories of departments of Science, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Microbiology, Biochemistry, Physics, Computer science, Home Science, Commerce & Management, Psychology, Home Economics, Yoga, Geography, English and Music

etc. Surveys methods are used by the department of Chemistry, Sociology, Economics, Geology, Botany, Zoology, Forensic Science, and Geography etc. Market surveys are conducted by the department of Economics. Field surveys are conducted in the departments of Geology, Botany, Zoology, Forensic Science and Geography. Students participate in Avishkar which is Research Convention of Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University, held every year at college, district, university and state levels. Earn while learn Scheme and Enterprenaurship development cell are the platform for Experential learning. The teaching departments arranged students' visits to industries relevant to the courses and its curriculum.

Project work: - Project work is a part of curriculum in most of the under graduate and post graduate courses such as Chemistry, Physics, Computer science, Microbiology, Forensic Science, Geology, Electronics, Biochemistry, Botany. Students are guided by subject expert for the completion of their projects and dessertations.

Participative Learning: - Teachers motivate students in the classroom to participate in teaching learning process. All the teaching departments organized student activities to promote the participative learning. College has active NSS and NCC units which promoted participative learning. Our students participated in Village Adoption, Tree Plantation, Swatchh Bharat Abhiyan, Health Awareness Camp, Fashion Show, Cultural and Sports Competitions, Exhibitions, Nature Club, Wild Life Week and Skill Development Programs. Many workshops are conducted throughout the year under the guidance of teachers. Students participated in conferences, workshops, seminars and competitions, organized in and out of the college. Institute published Shivdarshan magazine every year, edited by students and teachers. Study tours, Field visits and Botanical Excursion Tours and extension activities are arranged to engage students in participative learning.

Problem solving methodologies: - Students developed logical thinking and gained practical knowledge essential to solve new problems by working on projects. Problem solving methods are extensively used in the teaching of Physics, Mathematics, Computer Science, Statistics and Commerce. Free internet access in the library and Wi-Fi facilities in campus promoted students to solve the problems. Group discussion developed problem solving strategies among the students. Research activities are conducted in each department under the guidance of teachers. Students formulated their own problem solving methods while working on projects for Avishkar.

2.3.2 Teachers use ICT enabled tools for effective teaching-learning process.

Response:

The Institute encourages faculty members to use ICT facilities effectively and efficiently. The diversity of the students in terms of their socio economic and educational background prompts for innovative ICT teaching strategies to enhance learning. The institute has made conscious efforts in this direction.

There are 44 well-furnished classrooms and out of them 22 classrooms and seminar halls are well equipped with LCDs/DLPs and other ICT teaching tools. Along with the chalk and talk, ICT enabled teaching tools helped students to understand the concepts effectively. All the departments are IT-enabled with internet, Wi-Fi and LAN connectivity.

Most of the Departments are well equipped with ICT teaching aids like computers, laptops, LCDs/DLPs. Some departments have been using Smart Boards. Science Departments are facilitated with Dry and Wet lab technique for practical work with technical instruments. Commerce and Management faculty uses Statistical Package for Social Sciences (SPSS) for data analysis. N- Computing system is established in most of departments. Faculty and students of Political Science department conducted pre poll election surveys and analysed its results using SPSS software. Language Laboratory is available in the English department for efficient and enhanced teaching and learning of English language and related courses with Orell software. ARGIS software is used in the Department of Geology. Department of Zoology used virtual demonstrations in addition to the animal models from museum for laboratory work. Open source and free to use softwares such as ChemDraw, Avogadro, JMol, Periodic Table are widely used by the faculty of Department of Chemistry for teaching and research. The college has established Resource Centre for Inclusive Education which caters the teaching and learning needs of differently abled students using ICT. It is funded by Rashtriya Ucchatar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA) and Govt. of Maharashtra.

Educational CDs and DVDs are available as learning material in departmental and central libraries. The college has been a regular subscriber of NLIST and DELNET which offer scholarly e-content for research and teaching. NLIST and DELNET accounts are provided to PG students, research scholars and faculty members. Webinars and Various e-learning resources such as e-Journals, e-Books, e-Shodhsindhu and online databases NLIST and DELNET are extensively used by the faculty members and students which enhance and enrich the teaching, learning and evaluation process.

Open Educational Resources such as SWAYAM-NPTEL, Youtube Videos, etc. are accessed by teachers and recommended to the students. Faculty members and students use online classes and content. Our students and teachers participated and used the courses offered by SWAYAM-NPTEL which is evident from the growing number of faculty members and students enroll in these courses. Most of the faculties developed and posted/uploaded practical demonstrations on Youtube. Some of the departments have also developed a website to provide teaching learning material to students during the COVID-19 pandemic. Google Classroom, Google Form, Zoom, Google Meet, BigBlueButton, Whatapp groups etc. are extensively used for teaching, learning and evaluation by our faculty members.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Response:

The mechanism of internal assessment in the institution is transparent and robust. It follows the regulations and guidelines of Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University, Amravati (MS) for the internal evaluation process of theory & practical subjects. At the beginning of academic session, college forms internal assessment committee for effective implementation of internal assessment of the students. Internal assessment committee prepares yearly calendar with the consultation of all the heads of departments for smooth functioning of internal assessment. The process of conducting internal assessment and examination is informed to students and parents during the orientation/induction program. The programm of internal assessment is prepared and posted on the institution's website and circulated for staff and students.

The syllabus for internal assessment is informed to students in the class by the subject teachers one week in advance. The question papers and scheme of evaluation are prepared by the subject teachers as per university syllabus and guidelines. The departmental internal exam coordinator and HOD moderate the question papers after considering Programme Outcome and Course Outcome. To ensure transparency, students have to write answers in the answer books which is provided by the college.

The internal evaluation begins in the classroom by conducting unit tests. For every subject, two internal

assessment tests are conducted as per university directions. The marks obtained in internal assessment tests are included in the marksheets. Throughout the academic year, the performance of the students is assessed by assignments submission, project works, seminar presentation, group discussion, study tour, case study and practical work.

Subject teachers evaluate the answer sheets and give suggestions to students with counselling on how to improve the answers. The evaluated answer sheets are provided to the students for their overall observation. Transparency in internal evaluation is ensured by displaying marks on the departmental notice board. If any grievance, students concern to the subject teachers for the corrections. The subject teachers deal with the students problems regarding evaluation and allotted marks. If the student is not satisfied, the matter is placed before the Head of department.

After Internal assessment process, the answer books, assignments, projects, survey reports, case studies, field visit reports are collected and preserved in the departments. For transparency in internal assessment, advance mentoring, academic calendar, grievance redressal, and displaying of internal marks are practiced.

Written-Test, Practical Examination, Multiple Choice Question (MCQ), Online Exam, Quiz Competition, Assignments Submission, Projects Reports, Seminars Presentation, Group Discussion, Survey Methods, Study Tour, Industrial Visits and Field Visits are the modes of conducting Internal assessments.

2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal/external examination related grievances is transparent, timebound and efficient

Response:

Mechanism to deal with Internal Examination related grievances:

Written-Test, Practical Examination, Multiple Choice Question (MCQ), Online Exam, Quiz Competition, Assignments Submission, Projects Reports, Seminars Presentation, Group Discussion, Survey Methods, Study Tour, Industrial Visits and Field Visits are the modes of conducting internal assessments. Transparency in internal evaluation is ensured by displaying marks and performance of the students on the departmental notice board. After the evaluation of unit tests, answer sheets are provided to the students for their overall observation. If any grievance, regarding obtained marks and performance in other internal activities, students concern to the subject teachers for the corrections. The subject teachers deal with the students problems regarding evaluation and allotted marks. If the student is not satisfied, the matter is placed before the Head of Department. Grievances associated with the internal examination are taken up immediately and resolved.

Mechanism to deal with External Examination related grievances :

The institute conducts semester university examination in the college as per university examination schedule. The question papers and answer sheets are provided by affiliated university. The question papers are set and moderated as per prescribed syllabus in the university. If the student's grievance is related with the question papers, it is informed to the university authorities i.e. Board of Examination. The Board of Examination places the matter before Board of Studies. After the decision of Board of Studies, the Board of Examination resolves the grievances of the students.

The common grievance of the students regarding Question Papers are:

- Out of syllabus questions
- Misprint in question papers
- Allocation of marks to questions
- Incorrect options to MCQ's

As soon as examination is over, the answer sheets are sent to the University for Central Evaluation. University is bound to declare results within 40 days. After the declaration of result, the students get the marks sheet at college level.

The common grievances of the students regarding result are:

- Answer sheets' undervaluation
- Change of medium opted by the student
- Change of name or misspelled
- Change in subjects opted by the student
- Incorrect internal marks
- Absent remark
- Withheld result for unknown reason

For the above mentioned grievances, the students approach to the administrative office. If the grievance is related with the undervaluation of answer sheet, students concern the subject teachers and apply to the university within 15 days from the date of declaration of the result for the photocopy of the answer sheet or revaluation of answer sheet. For the remaining grievances, the college writes and submit the required documents to the university authority for the correction. The students' grievances related to external examination are solved in time bound period.

2.6.2 Attainment of programme outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution.

Response:

The Institution offers Under Graduate, Post Graduate, Research and Career Oriented programs in the Faculties of Humanities, Commerce and Management, Science and Technology and Home Science. The courses under these programs follow the syllabi prescribed by Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University, Amravati. The students acquire knowledge and skills in the duration of their chosen program that brings out the best from them to develop a better future for themselves and for contribution to the betterment of society and the country.

The performance of students is monitored and evaluated for measuring the attainment of Program Outcomes, Program Specific Outcomes and Course Outcomes through internal, external evaluation, placement, progression to higher studies, skill development and start-ups.

Assessment tools:

• Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University guidelines have given a weightage of 20% for internal

assessment and 80% for external assessment in the form of internal and external examinations. Internal evaluation takes into account journal writing, timely assignments submission, seminar presentations, unit tests, tutorials and quizzes. The faculty members review students regularly on these criteria and provide opportunity for students to improve their performance. Students' participation in competitions, seminars and conferences, research competitions and other events support the attainment of the stated outcomes. The internal and external assessment systems are off course a way of evaluation. Furthermore, students are observed for their involvement in participatory learning, eagerness to take initiative in activities, improved learning capabilities, development of confidence and personality building etc. Observation and conversation accurately reflect what is achieved from the curriculum. Through external examination, academic performance is assessed. Meritorious students are recognised by felicitating in the institution on Republic Day celebrations and awarded scholarships from the fund raised by teachers and philanthropers. University results are thoroughly reviewed and analysed during Academic audits of departments and discussed in Staff Council Meetings as well as in College Development Committee.

- Through students feedback mechanism the programm and Course outcome are evaluated.
- Number of Students' progression to higher studies reflected the Programm and Course outcome. 80% Students go for Higher studies like UG to PG and PG to Ph.D. Students also appeared for Eligibility and entrance exams like SET/ NET/ GATE/ JAM/ etc.
- Some Students opted for competitive exams held by Government and non-government organisations.
- Placement, self employment, entrepreneurship status and social initiative of the students show the result of Programm and Course Outcome as stated by the Institution.
- Students after their study attended placement through On campus/ Off Campus interviews and selection process.
- Students started their small scale business of their interest, Entrepreneurship cell guided these students.

3.2 Innovation Ecosystem

3.2.1 Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations and has initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge

Response:

The college has proper mechanism for innovation, creation and transfer of knowledge. The college authority used to take every possible initiative to support and accelerate the innovative ideas of the students and teachers. The college established Research Advisory Committee (RAC) to support, observe and monitor the research activities. The college appointed a senior and experienced Professor, who worked as a coordinator of RAC. RAC facilitated the effective research assistance to research students who are pursuing Ph. D. degree in different subjects and also inculcated the research aptitude among the UG and PG students. Since academic session 2018-19, the affiliating university recognized our college as a centre to conduct the Pre-Ph. D. course work in four disciplines i.e. Humanities, Commerce and Management, Science and Technology and Interdisciplinary Studies. Currently out of **99** faculty members, **67** faculty members of the college are with Ph. D. as highest qualification and **38** faculty members are research supervisor for Ph. D. and M. Phil research. During this accreditation period, **66** students have completed their Doctoral research under the guidance of supervisors from various research centres/ subjects of the college and awarded the Ph. D. Degree by affiliating university and over **70** students are working for their doctoral research at this center.

The RAC in the college regularly encouraged teachers to submit the proposals to various funding agencies for research grants and to participate in various conferences, seminars and intellectual activities. During this assessment period, the college organized **02** International and **03** National conferences, **01** State level, several regional and University level seminars and workshops. The college has **24 MOU's** and academic

linkages. During last five years, the college teachers published **577** research papers and articles in various (UGC notified, Scopus, WOS and reputed peer reviewed) journals. The faculty members published **123** book chapters/books, published by reputed National/ International publishers and Conference Proceedings.

The college authority and faculty members encouraged students to participate in the events like Youth Festival, Indradhanush and Avishkar (Research Festival) where the dais for research orientation is made available to the students along with cultural activities. The college hosted the District Level Avishkar (Research Festival) from 2016 to 2018 and University level Youth Festival in 2018. Apart from this, college organized college level research festival, seminars, skill development programs and workshops for students. The campus flora, field/ industrial visits and surveys also gave experiential learning to students. The college has facility of Central Instrumentation Cell and Entrepreneurship Cell to students for actual scientific experimentation and incubation.

The RAC regularly used to organize seminars and workshops on related themes of Intellectual Property Rights. Most of these were interlinked to Academics- Research and Intellectual Property. The basic motto was to make the teachers and students aware regarding the need and role of IPR. Entrepreneurship cell of the college is providing good opportunities to students to present their creativity and to develop entrepreneur skills. Along with career counselling, the in-house mentoring of the students resulted into establishments of trades and firms by some students.

3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1 Extension activities are carried out in the neighborhood community, sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development, and impact thereof during the last five years.

Response:

The college organized various extension activities with the active involvement of teachers to inculcate the awareness and responsibilities among the students regarding the common social issues i.e. International Yoga Day, Tree Plantation, Voters Awareness Rally, Organ Donation Campaign, Polio Awareness Programme, Social Equity Week, Girls Security Programme, Road Safety Programme, Corona Vaccination and Safety Awareness Programme. Students are encouraged to develop a social mind-set for the betterment of society and social harmony. Some major extension activities are as follows:-

Cleanliness Drives: The cleanliness drives are conducted during various occasions by NSS and NCC units. It is prime and regular practice. Along with actual workout, students created awareness about the cleanliness at varied public places like railway station, bus stand etc. The work of NSS unit in this field was awarded by District level awards for four times in last five years.

Morna River Cleanliness Drive: As a positive response to Commissioner, Akola Municipal Corporation, Akola to clean the river Morna, NSS and NCC unit of the college were actively involved in this campaign, organized in the session 2018-19.

Awareness Programs: Various departments organized awareness programs like Aids Awareness Program by NSS & NCC Unit, Environment Day, World Wetland Day celebration and plantation Programs by Department of Botany, Voter Awareness Day Department of Political Science, Ozone Day by Department of Chemistry, Wildlife Week by Department of Zoology, World Consumer Day by Department of Commerce etc. Such awareness programs also impacted the society.

Blood Donation Camps: Every year on the occasion of Late Dr. Bhausaheb Deshmukh Jayanti Utsav, Department of Biochemistry of the college organized blood donation camp in association with NGO or Govt. organization.

Samajik Diwali Celebration: Being a component of society, college used to organize Samajik Diwali

celebration in tribale villages to share the festivity with deprived people, where food items, general medicines and clothes were distributed to tribal people.

Visit to Old Age Home: Every year, some faculty members along with students visited to Matoshree Vrudhashram (Old age home) to share their pains and inculcate the social responsibilities among students, where food items, general medicines and clothes were distributed to people.

Plastic Ban Campaign: Plastic is the greatest threat to environment, therefore, a campaign to eradicate plastic and plastic ban was organized to make the students aware and to spread this message to the society.

Flood Relief Contribution: In 2018, the northern Maharashtra had faced a natural flood disaster. For flood affected people, the students collected a fund and some important needful articles and sent the help to them.

Social Harmony Week: Every year, a Social Harmony Week is observed from 10th April to 14th April. On this occasion, various social workers were invited to speak on different aspects of social harmony and role of social reformers in shaping harmonious society. These are the open sessions for everyone in the society.

Such programs helped to inculcate the social responsibilities among the students. As a token impact of sensitizing students regarding social issues is reflected in their active contribution in natural disaster management like floods and Covid pandemics. Some of the students have been awarded and felicitated by several NGO's and Government of Maharashtra.

Criterion 4 - Infrastructure and Learning Resources

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Response:

The infrastructure set up of the entire campus aids teachers and students towards achieving academic excellence. The infrastructure is adequate and shared by all the programs in two shifts for optimum use. Faculty of Commerce and Management functions in the morning shift, whereas, Faculty of Humanities, Science and Technology and Home Science at afternoon shift.

The college has a land area of 7.02 acres and total built up area is 21,196.91 sq.mt, with G+2 floors and adequate parking facility. The institution has well equipped classrooms with LCD/DLP projectors, laboratories, computer labs, and seminar halls, central and departmental libraries for the effective teaching-learning process. There are 333 computing systems with round a clock Wi- Fi facility with 50 Mbps bandwidth. The institution follows ICT enabled, practical oriented, learner- friendly modes of instruction to make student centric teaching process.

To make learning process practical and research oriented, the department and research laboratories are well equipped and timely upgraded with advanced equipments. A separate Central Instrumentation Center (CIC) with advanced instruments is available for promoting research in the field of science. The college has a dedicated language laboratory to engage students to actively participate in language learning activities. It has 20 computers with other accessories and Orel software. The department of Zoology, Botany and Geology maintained Zoological, Botanical and Geological museums respectively. Besides this, vermicomposting, compost pits and Biogas unit are also developed.

The college has an auditorium with seating capacity of around 250 with DLP facility to facilitate cocurricular and cultural activities and 14 seminar halls to cater the needs of audio visual necessity of the events such as guest lectures, seminars, meetings and conferences.

The central library is computerized with NLIST and DELNET Consortia with remote log-in access to eresources. The library is enriched with a large section of reference books, text books, e- resources, and reading hall with capacity of 300 students. Resource center for inclusive education having braille books and talking books facility is funded by RUSA. Network Resource Centre (NRC) is available for students.

The college has Mahatma Gandhi, Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar and Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru Study Centers and Dr. Panjabrao Deshmukh Memorial meditation Hall.

Additional Infrastructural Facilities:

In campus, there is a Branch of Bank of Maharashtra with ATM, Post Office, two Ladies hostels, proposed Boys hostel, rain water harvesting system, a fire fighting water hydrant system and solar energy generation system with capacity of 10 kV. There is a facility of ramps for the physically challenged students to move by the wheel chair without any difficulty. Available physical infrastructure is optimally utilized beyond regular teaching to carry out research projects, certificate courses, co-curricular activities, staff meetings

etc . The college runs Salary Earners Society for welfare of its employees. Terraces of all buildings are also utilized for necessary facilities like installation of Solar Panels, Water storage tanks, Toilets etc. College has Green beautiful campus with ornamental plants and landscapes. Botanical Garden is situated near Department of Botany. The Plants in the garden have medicinal and economic importance. The flora and fauna in the campus also serve as a means of environment and biodiversity conservation.

4.1.2 The Institution has adequate facilities for cultural activities, sports, games (indoor, outdoor), gymnasium, yoga centre etc.

Response:

The institute, with compulsory core courses and continuous evaluation system, integrates sports and other extracurricular activities as an essential component. The participation in these activities helps to develop teamwork, self-confidence, and self-discipline among the students. The infrastructure of an institute is adequate for cultural activities, sports, games, gymnasium and yoga centre.

Facilities for Cultural Activities:

The college has an auditorium, AV hall, Open space and seminar halls to organize cultural activities. College has Vasant Auditoriums, its built up area is 198.34 sq.mt. with 250 seating capacity. It is furnished and well equipped with ICT facilities for organising online events and sound system. It is attached with the preparation room required for students to get ready for cultural events.

The open platform and space with 585.96 sq.mt. area is available to organise annual gatherings, grand cultural event, Youth Festival, Republic/Independence day celebration. Besides, 14 seminar halls are used to conduct various cultural and extra-curricular activities at departmental level i.e. some events of youth festival, welcome function, alumni meet, farewell functions and various competitions etc.

Facilities for Sports and Games

The institute has adequate infrastructure facilities for indoor and outdoor sports and games.

The indoor halls (Khashaba Jadhao Indoor Hall) built up area is 226.59 sq.mt. with Physical Directors office 18.82 sq.mt., store room of 6.05 sq mt.area. and changing room. Play Fields i.e. Table Tennis, Badminton, Carrom ,Chess are developed in indoor hall.

Whereas for outdoor games, play ground with area 1669.80 sq.mt.is available in college campus for play fields i.e.Volley Ball, Kabaddi, Kho kho, and Basket Ball.

Institute hires district playgrounds for some outdoor games like Cricket, Running Track, Basketball,

Boxing, Swimming etc.

Sports Equipment :-

The sports equipments are available in sports department i.e. Cricket Kit bag, Stump, Bat, Ball, Volley Ball, Badminton Rackets. Shuttle Cocks, Badminton Net Pole, Badminton Nylon Net, Basket Ball Pole Set, Basket Ball Board, Table Tennis, Table Net Stand with Net, Bats, Balls, Foot Balls, Hand Balls, Chess Boards, Boxing Gloves, Boxing Head Guards, Boxing Punching Bag, Boxing Punching Bag etc.

Gymnasium:-

Gymnasium, named **Shivshakti** with changing room, is established with advaned equipments for staff and students in college campus as a fitness centre, its built up area is125.46 sq.mt. The best facilities are provided for Wrestling, Weight Lifting, Best Physique, Gymnastics and Taekwondo. The expertise trainer is appointed in the Gymnasium. Required equipment's are available in Gymnasium i.e. Dumbbells, Trade mill, Abdomen Crunds, Leg Pires, Assisted Chain, Chess Press, Cross Over, Weight Plate Rack, Spine Bike, Bench Press Bench, Incline Bench, Decline Bench, Per Dec with Rear Delft etc.

Yoga Centre:-

Well-developed Yoga and Meditation Centre, in the Honour of Great Reformer Dr. Panjabrao alias Bhausaheb Deshmukh, is established with built up area 88.99 sq.mt. It is a very proud moment for our college to set this Meditation Centre. Yoga teacher is apointed to guide the staff and students. Every year, International Yoga Day is organized on 21st June by the Yoga Centre for students & staff members. Students actively participated in Rathasaptami Suryanamaskar Divas.

Integrated Library Management System (ILMS)

The Library is fully automated with the SOUL software of INFLIBNET since 2002 and later updated with SOUL 2.0 and SOUL 3.0 software. The process of Acquisition, Ordering, Cataloguing, and Circulation is done through SOUL 3.0 software. The books are classified according to Dewey Decimal Classification Scheme. Borrowers Ticket and Book Cards are Bar-coded. Books are processed with bar-coded spine labels. For effective implementation of Integrated Library Management System, Library has 01 Server System, 20 Computers for services, OPAC and Network Resource Centre, Scanners, Printers, Barcode readers, Braily Printer, Internet Leased Line.

E-Resources

In addition to providing access to its printed resources such as books, periodicals, the library is well equipped with e-resources such as NLIST, DELNET, E-Books for faculty and students. Remote access facility for E-resources is provided to Users. The library is fully computerized with the application of bar-code technology. The students have access through OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue). The newly enrolled students are given orientation about facilities and services. Training about use of NLIST/ DELNET consortia is provided to Research students and Staff.

Resource Centre for Inclusive Education:

Resource Centre for Inclusive Education is started to provide services to physically challenged students. For the establishment of this centre, Rashtriy Uchchhatar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA) funded Rs. 15 lakhs. Two hundred Brailly Books, Talking Books, Computers, Brailly Printer and softwares are available for visually impaired students. Talking books with JAW, Type Ability, Daisy conversion Duxbury Braille translation, Hindi OCR, Marathi OCR is available for differently abled students.

The Institution frequently updates its IT facilities including Wi-Fi

- There are 317 computers and 19 laptops available in the institution. The configuration of the computers is upgraded as per the advancement in the technology, starting with Intel Pentium Dual core, RAM 1GB, HDD- 255GB, Monitor- 19.5" and continued with recent Intel Pentium 3.1 Ghz. II, RAM-8 GB, HDD- 1 TB, Moniter-27.0", Dell Keyboard and Mouse.
- In Computer lab, Commerce lab, office and Library were separate computer systems were installed. Later on Computers are connected with LAN facility. Recently N-Computing system has been provided in most of the departments.
- At the beginning, Internet facility was provided with wired connection to Administrative office and Departments. Then it is updated with Broad Band through LAN with increasing connections and VPN 70 Connection with 2Kbps to 2 Mbps. Now, fibre optic connection with 100 MBPS & Leased line connection are setup in departments. Initially, we started with using CAT-5 then

CAT-6 cables and now we use OFC (optical fibre cable) which gives fast speed.

- Wi-Fi facility is available with 1 GB free access for each student in College Campus.
- Antivirus named Quick Heal Pro, Quick Heal Total Security Net Protector Pro and total Security are installed in all Computers and updated regularly.
- For continues power backup, Institute has inverters, UPS and diesel generator and solar system.

Response:

There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, and classrooms in the institute.

Policies for Maintenance

The budgetary provision for augmentation and maintenance of the infrastructure is made at the beginning in every session. It is approved by the College Development Committee. Outer Services are hired for maintenance of physical and academic infrastructure. Skilled persons are appointed on contract basis. Regular cleanliness of the classrooms and campus is maintained by Daily wages labour. Annual Contracts are signed for the maintenance of major instruments.

Procedures for maintaining and utilising Physical Facilities: -

The Institute implements various procedures for maintaining the Physical facilities. Purchase and Building committees are formed for construction and maintenance. The college administrative officers and members of discipline, vigilance and code of conduct committee regularly monitor and supervise the overall infrastructure and ensure its repairing and maintenance work. Head of the Departments submit their requirements for the maintenance of physical facilities. As per the requirement, budgetary provision is made for infrastructure augmentation and maintenance of physical, academic and support facilities. Budgets for construction, purchasing equipment's, maintenance, repairing and developmental work is estimated in the meeting of respective committees and forwarded to parent management for sanctioning. Tender notice is published to call quotations for purchasing items. After receiving quotations, the lowest rates are approved and orders are placed. Technical experts are nominated to look after maintenance of civil construction, renovations, carpentry, plumbing, water supply, furniture and electric maintenance work. Skilled persons are appointed on contract basis for maintenance for Electric, Gardening, Plumbing and cleaning.

Utilisation of Physical Facilities:-

- Infrastructure is used in two shifts for optimum use. Faculty of Commerce and Management function in the morning whereas Faculty of Humanities and Faculty of Science and Technology at noon shift.
- Gymnasium facility is provided at morning and evening shifts and it is available for college and other students.
- Auditorium is used for organizing cultural events and also given to Government, Non- government and Social organizations to conduct various cultural activities.
- College ground is used for organizing various sports events and it is also provided to Government, Non- government and Social organizations to conduct various sports activities
- Apart from teaching, the classrooms are provided to conduct government and non-government various competitive examinations (MPSC, NEET, CET, Staff Selection, Banking etc.) On Sunday, the classrooms are made available to conduct distance learning classes.
- Central Instrumentation Cell is provided for consultancy services to researchers.
- The resource centre for inclusive education provides facilities for Divyangas.
- During Corona pandemic, our college provided space for corona vaccination centre.
- Women Hostel was given to establish isolation centre for Covid patients during Corona pandemic.

Maintenance of Academic Facilities:-

The Institute appointed technical expert on contract basis to look after the maintenance of academic facilities i.e. Computers, Teaching aids, Scanners, Printers, LCD/DLP. Annual maintenance contract is made for some major Instruments.

At the end of every academic year, stock verification is carried out by stock verification committee. After detail scrutiny and verification of laboratory equipment and instruments, Committees place its report for the updating and maintenance. Repairable goods are forwarded to concerned expertise person.

Utilisation of Academic facilities:-

- For optimum use of academic facilities, Faculty of Commerce and management function in the morning whereas Faculty of Humanities and Faculty of Science and Technology at noon shift.
- Commerce Computer laboratory and Computer Science laboratory are used in two shifts.

- Library Facilities are available in two shifts.
- Central Instrumentation Cell provides advanced scientific instrumentation facilities to the researchers and students.

Maintenance of Support Facilities:-

Maintenance of Laboratories, Library, Classrooms, Computers and Sports Complex

The proper usage of human resources improves cleanliness and orderliness of all support facilities in college campus. The cleanliness work of all laboratories, Library, Classrooms is maintained by permanent support staff under the supervision of Heads of the departments. For the proper maintenance and cleanliness of the corridors, stairs, ramps, washrooms, pavements and campus, employees are appointed on daily wages basis.

Laboratories: -

Laboratories are maintained by respective departments. Proper care of chemicals, Glasswares and instruments is taken by laboratory attendant under the supervision of Head of the Departments. Useless Glasswares and instruments are write off every year. Hazardous chemicals are properly disposed. Biomedical waste is handovered for disposal to municipal corporation. All laboratories are provided safety measures i.e. Fire Extinguisher, Exhaust.

Library:-

Library is fully automated. There is a good collection of textbooks, reference books, magazines, journals etc. In library, e-library facility is provided with access to e-books, e-journals, NLIST/ DELNET, Databases, it is properly looked by the technicians. Librarian regularly monitors the condition of the library collection, issue and maintenance of the books like covering, binding etc. Books cases and reading rooms are cleaned and maintained by Library attendants. Apart from the Central Library, we also have departmental libraries that provide reference books, journals to the students which are maintained by Incharge Teacher.

Classrooms:-

Classroom furniture is maintained regularly. The cleanliness of classrooms is a daily practice. It is done through outsourcing labours. Electric connections, ICT facilities and other appliances are maintained by technician.

Computers: -

The administrative office is fully computerised. There are separate computer laboratories for Commerce and Computer science departments. All the Head of Departments are provided computers with ICT facilities. Computer technician regularly updates softwares and install antivirus.

Sport Complex: -

Indoor and Outdoor Sport facilities are maintained by Director Physical Education. Play grounds and sports equipments are looked after by the Department of Physical Education. The institute appointed a

trainer to operate the Gymanasium. Yoga and meditation centre is developed. It is cared by In-charge Teacher.

Utilisation of Laboratories, Library, Classrooms, Computers and Sports Complex: -

Laboratories, Library, Classrooms and Sports Complex are used in two shifts i.e. morning and noon. Computer laboratories are made available for conducting online examination and data entry services agencies. Apart from teaching, classrooms are provided to conduct various government, non-government competitive exams and distance learning education. Various outside games and sports competitions are held on Indoor and outdoor play fields.

Most of our alumni are financially well settled. They desired to support financially for academic and infrastructural development of college. In the last five years, numbers of alumni contributed generously for this noble cause. They donated more than 10 lakh rupees, Books, Equipments, Instruments and Computers.

Other Support Services:-

Alumni association organized several programmes for the benefit of students.

• Alumni Meet & Felicitations:

Alumni Meet is arranged for motivation and guidance of the students. Meritorious students are felicitated by eminent alumni. They share their own experiences and encourage students to get success in life. In addition to this, some Post Graduate departments organized Alumni Meets at the Departmental level.

• Guest Lecture Series and Workshops:

Alumni association organised guest lecture series and workshops. It conducted subject wise guest lectures and workshops on oratory skill, personality development, communication skill, skill development and entrepreneurship etc. A lecture series on different topics is arranged in the college by distinguished alumni to share their varied experiences. By arranging the series of guest lectures, the institution intended to utilize the substantial contribution of our alumni in the academic field. The programmes also offered opportunities for the outgoing students to interact with our renowned alumni who are working in the diverse fields and emulate their models.

• Career Guidance and Placement Services-

Alumni, who hold administrative positions, conducted career guidance programmes. They guided students for different career opportunities and prepared them for interviews, group discussion, aptitude test etc. They also offered placement to the students and helped to achieve their career goals.

• Blood Donation Camp :-

Alumni organised blood donation and blood testing camp in college campus. One of our alumni gives concession in blood testing charges to college employee.

• Participation in Outreach Activities

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

A. Nature of Governance:

The Institution follows a democratic & participatory mode of governance. All stakeholders are participated actively in its administration. The college is governed by Shri Shivaji Education Society, Amravati, the biggest education institution in the Vidarbha region. As per the Maharashtra Public University Act 2016, it constitutes College Development Committee (CDC). The College Development Committee approves comprehensive academic, administrative and infrastructural development plan of the college in tune with the Vision and Mission of the institute. The principal of college is executive authority and shares power of governance with the different levels of functionaries in the college. The IQAC, heads of departments and committees/ cell's coordinators play an important role in policy decisions and implementing the same.

B. Perspective Plans:-

The institution prepares perspective plan for systematic and phase development.

- Application for grants to various government and non-government agencies.
- Extension through vertical expansion of infrastructure.
- Renovations to revive the ageing infrastructure of the institution.

- Improvement in Teaching- Learning through greater use of ICT & other innovative means.
- Introduction of new subjects at the UG /PG level.
- Submission of the proposals for skill development courses.
- MoU's with Research institutes.
- Mobilization of funds & projects through the alumina & other stakeholders.

C. Participation of Teachers in Decision Making Bodies:-

Teachers discharge an important role in implementing the vision and mission of the college and play a proactive part in the decision making process. Heads of the departments exercise considerable administrative and academic autonomy.

- Teachers influence institutional policies through the staff council, their representation on the College Development Committee, other Administrative, Academic and various Committees of the College constituted for the smooth functioning of academic and administrative work of the college.
- Teachers play important role as motivators and spearheads of cultural & socially conscious activities by steering the NSS, NCC, Nature Club, Study Centers, Sports and Dr. Panjabrao Deshmukh Birth Anniversary.

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6.1.2 The effective leadership is visible in various institutional practices such as decentralization and participative management

Response:

Decentralization: Governing body of Institute exercises general supervision and control of affairs of the college. It formulates the strategic policy decisions in interest of faculty and students. For proper deployment and execution purpose, a core committee named College Development Committee is formed in which representatives of heads of departments, teachers and non-teaching staff are members. It acts as a link between management and college. Meetings of College Development Committee are held regularly to discuss the matters related to development of students, faculty and college.

For smooth conduction of academics and administrative work, the college nominated a senior faculty as faculty in- charge for each faculty in the college who are working as the bridge between faculty members and Principal/ Governing body. Similarly, college constituted different committees to look after different academic, curricular and co-curricular activities.

Case Study - The college has a **purchase committee**; It looks after the decision of purchases and upgrading of infrastructure it includes management and teacher's representatives. Regular meetings are held in which the committee proposes the budget for purchase of laboratory, office equipments and other allied items. List of all items as decided by HODs are put forward regarding the structural changes and

other necessary equipment to purchase committee for approval. At the begining of academic session, tender notice is published in newspaper to call the quotations. The central store collects the quotations from different dealers and prepares comparative statement. The quotations are placed in the purchase committee and approved the less quoted items for purchasing. After the approval of the purchase committee, the orders are issued to purchase the items as per requirement. Central store keeper verifies the list of items and maintain the stock register. He forwards the bill to account section for payment. The purchase committee is authorized to deal the purchasing process of all the items which are required. In this process, decentralization of the management is reflected.

Participative Management: The culture of participative management is achieved through the committees operating at strategic level by Governing Body, College Development Committee, Principal and IQAC, Functional (Head of faculties and Head of Departments) and operational (Faculty and students) levels of management. Stakeholders at all levels have an opportunity to contribute his/ her innovative ideas leading towards achievement of excellence. Departments and the various committees coordinates with IQAC and submit the annual plan to the Principal, which is approved in IQAC and CDC. Through the interaction with the Principal, Head of the Departments and faculties, the academic calender is implemented effectively throughout the academic year. Students are also nominated as representative to conduct the activities. Such ambiance is created where students come forward with innovative ideas.

- The Head of the Departments oversees the Teaching Plans of the department.
- HOD is empowered to make adjustment in the routine and to allot teaching assignments and evaluation duties.
- HOD often takes the lead in planning different departmental activities and introduces new syllabus components.
- The Head, in consultation with departmental faculties, exercises total flexibility in planning and organizing seminars from the agency sponsored level to that of student's seminars.

The above features reflect a culture of participative management and decentralization of work.

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6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 The institutional Strategic / Perspective plan is effectively deployed

Response:

Shri Shivaji College of Arts, Commerce and Science, Akola, has been developed a lot during last few years. It is mainly due to the grants received from various resources, management support and funding agencies. The liberal policy and encouragement by the governing parent society also aid in the overall development of college. The perspective plan for the development has been chalked out after interaction with the IQAC and considering the suggestions of NAAC peer team visit during 3rd cycle of

reaccreditation in 2016 and implemented effectively for academic, co-curricular and infrastructural development of the college.

One Activity:

Entrepreneurship Cell:

The college implemented "Earn while Learn" scheme since 2010. It is one of the best activities of our college. Through this scheme, the college provided opportunities to students to earn money while learning in the college. The college gave the work to the students that requires skills related to computerization, tailoring, printing, wooden architecture, fabrics texturing, nursery techniques etc. It helped many students to earn money to meet their necessities and complete their education.

During the previous NAAC visit, the Peer Team suggested that the college has to go beyond the earn while learn scheme to help a larger group of students. It is a basic rout of inception of Entrepreneurship Cell. Later, while preparing the perspective plan of 2017-22, IQAC has decided to establish Entrepreneurship Cell. A committee was formulated by IQAC to develop the entrepreneurship cell under the Coordinator, Dr. Anjali J. Kaware, Head, Department of Home Science, who later channelized the work of establishment of this cell during the year 2017-18.

Objectives, Context and Practice:

Objectives:

The college has an Entrepreneurship Cell with an objective to go beyond the 'Earn while Learn' scheme and to impart innovation and entrepreneurship among the students.

To inculcate the values of self-employment through their abilities and skills, the objectives of the practice are-

- 1. To enhance the entrepreneurial spirit.
- 2. To provide entrepreneurial knowledge.
- 3. To provide a platform for inculcating entrepreneurial skills in students.
- 4. To encourage students to get self-employed.
- 5. To organise Entrepreneurship Development Programms and Workshops.
- 6. To motivate the students for participation in start-ups.

Context:

The current scenario indicates that employment opportunities are shrinking; therefore it is the need of the hour to convert small ideas to earn money. Many students are from agriculture background having agricultural resources for a start; but the fear of risk stops the students to indulge in entrepreneurship. In our multi faculty college, Entrepreneurship Cell is a platform, made available for students to explore their

capabilities.

Practice:

The college took the initiative to develop and support the students along with academics with a view to inculcate entrepreneurial initiative in students through several activities.

- Organization of Seminars, Webinars and Workshops on different topics related to skill development in various sectors for students.
- In house training to willing students regarding different skills.
- Display and marketing of the articles and goods in the entrepreneurship cell, prepared by students.

Evidence of success:

1) Every year, the selling of college uniforms to students, prepared by a group of students is attached to entrepreneurship cell.

2) Marketing of articles and goods in association with self help groups.

3) Some students have established their own small business/ trades.

4) Mask, sanitizer and sapling preparation and their selling.

6.2.2 The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment, service rules and procedures, etc.

Response:

Being an affiliated college of Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University, Amravati, our college adhers to the rules and regulations laid down by the UGC, Govt. of Maharashtra, and the affiliating university. College Development Committee is the apex managing body which consists of the members of the parent management, representatives of teachers and non-teaching staff, nominated members, students' representatives and the Principal as an ex-officio member. The Principal is academic and administrative head of the college. The IQAC is backbone of college for quality education and it consists Principal as a Chairman, teachers, non-teaching staff, nominated members of the Alumni Association, local bodies, members from the industry and student representative. The College Council consists of all the permanent teachers. The Students' Council is also formed as per the directives of the affiliated university. The office-

staff includes a Registrar, a Superintendent, Head Clerks, Senior Clerks, Junior Clerks, Stenographer, Accountant, Store-Keepers, Laboratory assistant, Laboratory attendants, peons, sweepers, watchmen work under the supervision of the Principal.

The Senior faculty members have been given the responsibility of heading their respective departments. Principal nominates a senior faculty member as a head of the faculty. The college authorities provide freedom and opportunities to each of the faculty members to plan and implement the various academic, extracurricular and extension activities through various committees, which helps to enhance and maintain the quality at all levels. Students' leadership is groomed through the Students' Council, which is formed every year as per the Maharashtra Public University Act, under the provision of the section 40(2)b. The students' representatives are nominated on various academic and extracurricular committees related to students. In the design and implementation of the policies and plans, a proper hierarchy is maintained. The Principal and the faculty members are committee and ever supportive through the College Development Committee, the College Council and the IQAC.

Service Rules: The College follows the rules and regulations pertaining to the service rules and conditions laid down by the affiliated university- Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University, Amravati, the UGC and the Government of Maharashtra from time to time.

Procedure for Recruitment: The recruitments of all the college posts- the permanent posts (Grant-in-aid) and temporary posts (NonGrant) are done by the parent management as per the norms and procedure laid down by the UGC, Government of Maharashtra and affiliating University.

Procedure for Promotion: Promotion to the faculty is given according to the directions and the CAS rules of the parent University Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University, Amravati, UGC, and the Government of Maharashtra.

Grievances Redressal Mechanism: The College has a Discipline Committee, Vishakaha Committee, Anti Sexual Harassment Committee, Anti-Ragging Committee, and Grievances Redressal Committee for the timely redressal of the grievances of the students and the faculty members, if any.

6.3.5 Institutions Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff

Response:

The prime motto of the college is to provide quality education to students. To achieve this, the college has a performance appraisal system to assess its human resources on regular basis. The college encourages each faculty member to take up activities related to teaching-learning and evaluation, co-curricular, research and extension, professional development etc. The College follows academic based self- appraisal mechanism as prescribed by Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University, Amravati. Every member of the teaching faculty is supposed to maintain his/ her Performance Record. These records are duly verified by the heads of the departments annually and submitted for the assessment to the Principal through IQAC. At the time of promotion, the faculty members have to produce his/her yearly academic appraisal forms with the documents to scrutiny committee for verification. Then the appraisal forms are singed by Coordinator of IQAC and Principal. Screening and selection Committees recommend the faculties for career

advancement. Thus, the college has established a multi-tiered and faultless assessment mechanism.

The College Staff Council meeting with the Principal of the college works as a corner stone for the quality assessment. Students feedback works as the chief external assessment mechanisms. The performance of the faculty is assessed by the students during such feedback. The feedbacks collected are compiled and consolidated outcome is handed over to the Principal for the further necessary action.

Every department also prepares its academic action plan which is considered as a department calendar. This plan is reviewed occasionally during the department staff meetings and priorities are re- reset. Every department tried to adhere to the direction of college authority while following the departmental calendar.

The college follows similar mechanism laid down by the parent society for the assessment and evaluation of teaching and non-teaching staff. At the end of the academic session, confidential reports of the teaching and non-teaching staff are prepared and duly assessed by the head of Departments, the Principal and the Secretary of the parent institution. On the basis of confidential report, non-teaching staff is recommended for their promotion. The Grievance Redressal platforms is available to resolve the issues related to teaching and non-teaching staff.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly

Response:

The college conducted internal and external financial audits every year on regular basis.

Internal Financial Audit:

The college has an internal financial audit mechanism for a preliminary audit of all the financial matters. For financial transactions, Campus- ERP software is installed. Through this software, all the accounts i.e. salary - non salary , no grants, scholarships, UGC and other accounts are maintained as per account rules and regulations. The cashbook and ledger books are regularly checked by the accountant. The vouchers are properly placed in the files for account varification. The parent institute appointed a registered Chartered Accountant for internal financial audit. The Chartered Accountant varifies all the financial matters i.e. vouchers, ledgers, cash books, bank details, opening and closing balance of all the accounts. After minute verification of the financial entries, he prepares an audited statement i.e. receipt and payment, income and expenditure statement of all the accounts and balance sheet of the college. If any, suggestion is also given by the Chartered Accountant for proper maintainance of all the accounts. The college has to

submit the audited statement of Senior College to the Joint Director Higher Education, Office before 31st July every year. Due to internal financial audit, all the accounts are maintained properly. The internal financial audit is deemed as a preparatory exercise for the external financial audit.

External Financial Audit:

Our College is grant-in-aid basis. So we are getting salary, non-salary, UGC, RUSA, DST and other Government grants for the academic and infrastructural developments. These grants have to be utilized as per the governments directions. The college utilizes and maintains the accounts as per account norms. Internal financial audit is carried out in every financial year. Senior auditor, Department of Higher Education and Accountant General office of the Government also check all the accounts of the college. Proper utilization of the grants, stock register and related documents are verified by them periodically. After external audit, they submit the assessment memo to the institution for further action. UGC office also verifies the utilization of grants for account settlement. Scholarship account is also audited by the social welfare office of the Government.

6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

Response:

Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources:

Mobilization of Funds:

Our college is grant-in-aid and self finance institute. So, our financial resources are salary, non-salary, UGC, RUSA, ICSSR, DST grants, Tution and other fees, donations from alumni, philanthropers and managements for financial support. For the optimum utilization of financial resources, the college constituted Planning, Purchase, Building construction, Internal audit committees. The parent institute appointed registered Chartered Accountant for Internal financial audit. The budgetary provisions are approved by the College Development Committee. All the Departments are bound to follow the budgetary provisions for the optimum utilization of funds. The accountant maintains all the accounts as per account norms.

For purchasing, tender notice is published in the news paper every year. The quotations for the purchase of all the items are called and scruitinized by the central store of the college. The comparative rate statements are placed before the purchase committee. After going through the rates, quality of the items and negotiation, the purchase committee takes decision to place the orders for purchasing. Through this process, the financial resources are optimally utilized. The building construction committee also follows the same process. It looks after the quality of material and constructions.

The fees are collected from the students as per University directions and utilized under the proper heads. Departmental Budgetary Provisions are communicated to the head of the Departments for purchasing of consumable and non-consumable items.

The donations received from almni and philanthropers are spent on academic and infrastructural development as per their suggestions.

As per the institutional requirement, the management provided financial support for infrastructural as well as academic development.

UGC, RUSA, ICSSR, DST grants are optimally utilized as per their guidelines.

Optimal Utilisation of Resources:

Academic and infrastructural resources are optimally utilized.

- The college academic work is in two shifts i.e. morning and noon shift.
- The infrastructral facilities like auditorium and college ground are given to Govenment, Nongovernment and Social organizations to conduct various events.
- The classrooms are provided to conduct various government and non-government competitive examinations (MPSC, NEET, CET, Staff Selection, Banking etc.)
- Central Instrumentation cell provides consultancy services to researchers.
- The resource center for inclusive education is providing facilities for Divyangas.

- The health fitness center of college is available for college and other students.
- On sunday, the classrooms are made available to conduct distance learning classes.
- During Corona pandemic, our college provided space for corona vaccination center
- College also made available women hostel to establish isolation center for Covid patients during Corona pandemic.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes

Response:

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has significantly contributed for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes by implementing quality scheme and practices.

• Promotion of Research and Development:

The IQAC frequently used to convey the faculty members to take up research projects from various agencies i.e. UGC, DST, ICSSR, BRNS etc., which increased sophisticated instrumentation facilities, books, journals and good publications. During last five years, faculties completed 13 research projects from various funding agencies and 02 projects are on-going. The total outlay of the projects sanctioned to faculty members of the college during last five year is around Rs. 93 Lakhs. Central Instrumentation Cell (CIC) is established that includes the instruments purchased from DST- FIST grants and other major instruments purchased from research projects. The major research instruments are available in Central Instrumentation Cell includes IR- Spectrophotometer, X-Ray Diffractormeter (XRD), Antena, Polarimeter, UV-Visible double beam spectrophotometer, and water analysis facilities. The number of research papers in UGC enlisted journals and various other databases are significantly increased. More than 550 research papers are published by the faculty members during previous five years. Most of the research papers are published either in scopus or Web of Science and UGC listed journals. The faculties have also published 123 books and book chapters in books published by reputed publication houses of National and International standards. One of the faculty members is granted a patent and one patent in pipeline. Further, IQAC recommended every department to organize conferences, seminars for the benefit of faculty members as well as students. So far during previous five years, various departments of College had organized 02 International Conferences, 03 National conferences and 01 State level seminar apart from various University, District level and regional workshops and competitions. The College has University recognized 15 Research centres/ laboratories and 38 Ph. D. Supervisors. From this centre more than 66 students have completed their Ph. D. Degree during last five years. The college has also

University centre for Pre-Ph. D. course work. From this centre, 110 research students completed their Pre-Ph. D. course work and 59 research students are registered for Ph. D. in different subjects so far. UG and PG students are motivated to participate in conferences, seminars, research conventions for paper presentation and research work in their respective disciplines with financial support.

• Increased Use of ICT for Teaching Learning

IQAC initiated to improve the ICT facilities in the college for teaching and learning purpose during last five years. Comparatively the ICT facility of the college was observed to be increased. It is discussed in IQAC meetings and resolved to strengthen the ICT facility for effective teaching learning process. The institute purchased equipment's i.e. LCD, DLP, Smart Boards, scanners, computer, laptops, printers etc., as well as developed ICT infrastructure. Currently, the college has 20 classrooms and seminar halls with ICT facilities; Five departments with computer Laboratories; two softwasres SPSS and ARC- GIS; Library with Network Resource Centre and Resource Centre for Inclusive Education. Parent Institution provided Learning Management System (LMS) for online teaching. Faculties developed e-contents and videos and posted on google classrooms. For online teaching, faculty used zoom, google meet platforms. Administrative and examination section are also fully supported with ICT facilities and necessary softwares.

Response:

The IQAC monitors and channelizes the efforts taken by the institute for academic excellence. The institute reviews its teaching learning process, structures and methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals through IQAC by different ways. Regular meetings of IQAC are conducted to collect the feedback from all the stakeholders and analysed for incremental improvements of the institute. The institute signed MoUs with other institutions for quality initiatives and participated in NIRF.

IQAC initiated for incremental improvements for quality enhancement in the last five years as follows-

- IQAC conducted Internal and External Academic Audits to evaluate the learning outcomes.
- ICT facilities are strengthened for better teaching-learning outcomes.
- Several books and Pragati Prakashan's e-books are purchased as per the requirement of various Departments. Library software SOUL-2.0 is updated to SOUL-3.0. DELNET is subscribed for e-

books and e-journals.

- Laboratories of Chemistry, Biochemistry, Botany, Physics, Forensic Science, and Biotechnology are upgraded.
- Central Instrumentation Facility is developed with Sophisticated Instrumentation such as IR, XRD, Double beam UV- Visible Spectrophotometer, Antenna characterization etc. to meet growing research and multi-departmental needs.
- Teachers have received research grants for minor and major research projects from different funding agencies like UGC, DST, BRNS, ICSSR.
- Add-on courses are introduced to promote employability.
- More Physical facilities like classrooms with furniture and fixture are created to meet the growing students strength.
- Competitive examination coaching is strengthened.
- Computer- student ratio has been improved.
- Entrepreneurship Development Cell is established.
- Proposals are submitted to introduced new PG Courses.
- Placement Cell and Career Development Cell are separated to effective implementation.
- Indoor hall is renovated with required facilities.
- Hostel, Canteen and drinking water facilities are improved and rationalized.

• Academic Administrative Audit:

IQAC conducted Internal and External Academic Audits to review teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals. The objective of the Academic and Administrative Audit is to evaluate and appraise the functioning of the department and ensure the quality standards of education with respect to curriculum, teaching-learning process, research work, co-curricular and extension activities. Department wise information's are collected in prescribed format. IQAC prepares a time schedule to visit the departments for verification and evaluation. Internal Audit Committee comprises the Principal, IQAC members, and Heads of Departments. The External Audit Committee comprises of academicians and certified consultants. Internal Academic Audit is conducted on yearly basis in the academic session 2016-17 and 2017-18 and the External Academic Audit in 2018-19. The Committee visits the departments and assesses the performance on various parameters like-

- Curriculum Design & Development Quality of curriculum & feedback on curriculum; New Courses, Value-added courses, Add-on courses, Certificate courses, Diploma courses, Short-term courses are reviewed.
- **Teaching, Learning and Evaluation** Creative and Innovative Teaching methodology, Teaching objectives and Learning outcomes, Remedial and Extra Coaching classes, Evaluation methods, Pass percentage, Student progression/ achievements, Faculty profiles are assessed.
- **Research, Consultancy and Extension** Research Projects, Publication, Consultation, Paper presentation, Professional development programs, Field visits, Internships and Industrial visits are evaluated.
- Student Support and Progression Days of celebration / Seminars, Career counselling & guidance, Training programs, Guest lectures, Workshops, Conferences, and Student participation in Intercollegiate/ Interuniversity events are considered.
- Innovative Best Practices of the Departments Green Initiatives, Rain Water Harvesting, Extension Activity, Outreach Programs are observed.

The departments present their departmental data with supporting documents to the Academic Audit

Committee for verification. After Departmental visits, Internal and External Academic Audit Committee prepares a detail report with observations, suggestions and recommendations. It also evaluate the Academic performance of the Departments.

ICT facilities are strengthened for better teaching-learning outcomes:

The IQAC focused on ICT facilities to be strengthened for better teaching-learning outcomes.

- Separate computer systems are installed in Computer lab, Commerce lab, office and Library. In laboratories, Computers are connected with LAN facility. N-Computing system has been provided in most of the Departments.
- There are 317 computers and 19 laptops available in the institution.
- Internet facility is strengthened with fibre optic connection with 100 MBPS and Leased line connection are setup in Departments.
- Wi-Fi facility is available with 1 GB free access for each student in College Campus.
- Antivirus named Quick Heal Pro, Quick Heal Total Security Net Protector Pro and total Security are updated regularly.
- For continues power backup, Institute has inverters, UPS, diesel generator and solar system.

7.1 Institutional Values and Social Responsibilities

7.1.1 Measures initiated by the Institution for the promotion of gender equity during the last five years.

Response:

Gender sensitization presides over gender sensitivity and the modification of behavior by raising awareness of gender equality concerns. It is achieved by conducting various sensitization campaigns, trainings, workshops, programs etc. College provided equal opportunities to women everywhere along with sports. Volley Ball, Boxing, Kho-Kho, Handball are some of the games in which girl students are selected for university teams and bagged prizes for the same.

Some of the measures initiated by the institution for the promotion of gender equity are as follows-

- After admission process, gender audit is carried out in every academic year. There is nearly an equal proportion of male and female students. In the year 2020-21, out of 5455 students, 2830 were girls students.
- There are separate wings of girl students in N.S.S as well as in N.C.C units.
- Sessions of debate, discussions, seminars & conferences are conducted for gender sensitization.
- Programs on 'Beti Bachao, Beti Padhao' were carried out by our college for generating awareness and to improve the efficiency of welfare services intended for girls in India.

Safety and Security:

Safe and secured environment is provided to all. Identity cards are provided to each staff and student which help to keep watch at entry level of premises. Security Guards at the entry gate always keep check on the gate crashers. The institute has two independent girls hostels for UG and PG with homely environment and care. The internal complaint committee, vigilance and discipline committee, redressal committee called 'Vishakha' committee, and Anti-ragging committee are formed. The college campus is well equipped with CCTV surveillance. Our college campus is totally secured with compound wall. From safety point of view, self-defense techniques are also taught to girls through trainers.

Counselling:

Admission Committee members, Guardian teachers, Vishakha Committee, Department of Psychology and Home Science are always on toes for guidance and counselling of the students. Health awareness activities are undertaken and counselling is given by the Health Centre regularly.

Common Rooms:

The separate and spacious girls' common room is available at ground floor. It is well ventilated and having wi-fi and water cooler setup. Facilities like lights, fans, washrooms, chairs, tables, sanitary napkin vending machine, charging sockets, mirrors, changing room are available. Boy's common room is also provided. Recreation rooms are made available for teaching and non-teaching staff.

- Girl students are vaccinated against Rubella to protect potential future mothers from the risk.

Response:

The college has established an integrated sustainable waste management approach to minimizes waste production and provides benefits through scientific waste management.

The college has a robust waste management system to handle diverse nature of wastes, generated from the garden, buildings, hostels, canteen, stores and laboratories.

Separate colour coded bins for different types of wastes are placed throughout the campus at important vantage points for proper collection and segregation of wastes. It prevented any intermixing of wastes. It is beneficial in utilization and recovery of components through sustainable waste management.

Solid Waste Management

Paper waste is reduced by circulating the documents and information through E-mail, What's App Groups and Website. The newspapers are redesigned for paper bags as an alternative to plastic bags and used in the Entrepreneurship Cell of the college. However, the office waste papers and old answer sheets of all departments are crushed and sent for recycling. Canteen and garden waste is used in the Compost Unit installed in the Botanical Garden for organic manure preparation. This manure is used for Botanical and college garden. It is also made available in Entrepreneurship Cell for selling. Vermi compost unit is installed to minimize solid waste of garden. Exhibitions on 'Best out of waste plants' is organized by Department of Botany. Heavy waste furniture is sent to the workshop for dismantling and recycling or reusing.

Liquid Waste Management

Water runoff is percolated underground below the pavers to replenish the ground water level. Microbial liquid waste of the Department of Microbiology is disposed after autoclaving such as spent culture supernatants and broth etc. Some Micro scale techniques are used in the laboratories to reduce the use of chemicals. Proper drainage facility is available to manage the liquid waste of washrooms.

Biomedical Waste Management

Biomedical waste from the Biochemistry and Microbiology Department is collected and sent for disposal and recycling through Municipal Corporation. For the same, an Agreement is signed with the Municipal Corporation.

E-waste Management

Electronic waste of the institute which commonly includes circuit boards, chips, broken computer monitors, discarded mobile phones, keyboards, discarded CDs, lamps, etc. are disposed off as per their conditions. Some are donated to the needy schools. Inverter batteries are handed over to skilled persons for dismantling or recycling. An agreement is signed with the E-waste management agency for the recycling of e-waste. The college is the collection center of E-waste.

Waste Recycling System

The office waste papers, old answer sheets of all departments are crushed and sent for recycling. Students of the Department of Home Science use waste papers to create articles for decoration purpose and paper bags for Entrepreneurship Cell. Retext (repurposing textiles)- a project for recycling of textile is carried out for the utilization of textile waste. Solvents are recycled by using Rota-vapour and reused in the laboratories.

Hazardous Chemicals and Radioactive Waste Management

Some of the experiments are carried out using green synthetic methods to minimize the use of hazardous solvents. Distillation methods are used for reclamation of used hazardous solvents.

The various Bachelors and Masters programmes sensitized the students for character development. The aim of curriculum is to inculcate values and attitudes among students, that enhance personal and family growth. It sensitizes them to various social issues for the development of human society. Prescribed courses includes papers or units dealing with issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability. Home Science learning teaches to use resources for a happy and sound life for better living. 7.2 Best Practices

7.2.1 Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual.

Response:

1. Title of the Practice: Community Outreach

Objectives of the Practice:

Students are the future of the country. They grow up and work for the betterment of the nation. The

students should be able to understand, react and interact to people's problems and trained to work to meet the social betterment of the society when they will be on move. Community Outreach activities contribute a lot to develop social senses. It is not only the society is benefited by such activities but also the students are personally benefited from such work. Outreach activities give satisfaction to the students by giving a helping hand to society, feel motivated, and inspire them to make their existence meaningful to the country. A sense of social responsibility is inculcated and nurtured in students. Students work in collaboration with Government and Non-Government Organisations. These co-curricular tasks empower students to be better and responsible citizens.

Students, who are admitted to the college, come from different strata of the society. As a part of social life, community services start at school and college level. But few opportunities of volunteering in outreach activities are less in the life of graduate and post graduate students. Knowing the society is more effective while serving and taking personal experiences. It builds valuable skills for future life. Developed strong moral values and matured character initiate people to tackle problems reasonably on their own without always depending on the government and non-government organisations.

Few objectives are -

- To broaden the perceptions of the world around the students.
- To have a broad open minded perspective of the life.
- To help the students to establish the communication with the surrounding.
- To inculcate values and develop a sense of social responsibility among students.
- To gain a plethora of experiences that helps to navigate the future.
- To understand social problems of the society.
- To develop Personality of student.
- To build confidence among students.

The Context:

Community outreach activities serve dual purpose. Not only it strengthens the student academically, but also helps students to build a better personality. The outreach activities give life lessons in which academic knowledge is utilised properly. The commitment to stick to the mission of the institution is the driving force for the selection of the practice.

By assessing the needs and resources available, the community activities are planned. Such activities inculcated discipline, sincerity, devotion among the students and empowered them to be responsible, secular and committed human beings; which is the need of hour. Our institute is a premier institute of excellence in knowledge building and social development. Such activities continued our commitment of education for inclusive growth for socio economic change and sustainable development.

Our institute is located in Akola city which is surrounded by rural and tribal areas. Being a small city, it is easier for outreach to conduct the program at personal level, meet people, listen to them, and build trust and healthy relationships with the targets.

The Practice:

Students and staff are actively engaged in several community activities. It is planned to whom to reach specifically and strategies are decided according to available resources. Method to involve and get

involved is different for different activities, such as- word of mouth, social media, posters, visits, webinars, etc.

The institutional base is expanded by the activities undertaken for differently abled persons under RUSA. (Rashtriya Uchchatam Shiksha Abhiyan). An enabling atmosphere could be created by involving our faculty and students to get involved in outreach activities.

The various outreach activities were conducted by NSS, NCC units, study centres, subject associations, departments and alumni to foster community network to contribute for good citizenship, for service orientation and holistic development of the students in last five years

- Service to community was provided through Anganwadi centres and Pre-school centres during National Nutrition week by the Department of Home Science.
- Knowledge sharing and interaction with lactating mothers was done in the Government hospital during International Breast Feeding week every year.
- Celebration of National Handloom Day every year for upliftment of the weaver community.
- Value based programmes undertaken in the memory of national leaders and influential historic personalities was a good practice.
- Skill development workshop for students and Self Help Groups was organized in collaboration with an organisation- 'Wawe'
- Department of Biochemistry released a song for Menstrual Hygiene; later promoted by UNICEF
- Webinar on "Converting lock down period into golden period-the role of women" was organized.
- Staff contributed rupees fourteen lac for Chief Minister's Relief -Covid-19 Fund.
- Students participated in celebration of Forest Conservation day every year.
- Students raised funds for eye surgery and cancer treatment of needy patient.
- Eye donation campaign was organised with the collaboration of Divyang Social Foundation Akola, Radio Vision Akola.
- Celebration of International White Cane Safety Day.
- Five students of NSS were appointed as special police officers for COVID-19 pandemic and felicitated by Superintendent of Police for their work during the Covid-19 pandemic period.
- Workshop on 'Awareness and Training on Sudden Cardiac Arrest' was organised by Department of Biochemistry in collaboration with Sath Sevak Foundation and iCARE.
- Awareness campaign on 'cracker free' Diwali was carried and appeal was made to ban the use of crackers, which is very harmful to the people suffering from the respiratory problems and corona patients.
- Clothes, snacks, mask, medicines were distributed to tribal people by students and staff while celebrating Diwali Festival with them at Khirpani (Tribal village in Melghat Forest).
- During COVID -19 pandemic period, sanitizer was distributed to municipal corporation employees and police department's vehicles were sanitised by the Department of Chemistry.
- Corona Care & Safety Awareness Programms were carried out on road for social awareness.
- Distributed masks to needy people in society and labours, farmers, drivers at Agricultural Produce Marketing Committee (APMC), Akola.
- Students worked as police friends (Police Mitra) in traffic control for public awareness.
- Students participated in Swachha Bharat Abhiyaan at Railway Station and other public places.
- Students distributed food and clothes to orphanage and interacted with them at Akoli (a nearby village).

- Tree plantation is a regular outreach activity and seed ball were prepared and thrown on the barren land by the students of Department of Botany.
- Students and staff donated grocery, clothes, daily need items and educational material to Kolhapur flood victims. Ten students involved personally in rescue operation in flood affected area.
- Institute commenced a series of Inspirational and Value Based Sessions 'Journey towards Excellence'
 - Session 1-Make Every day Count
 - Session 2-Believe in Yourself
 - Session 3-Interview etiquettes-Dos and Don'ts
 - Session 4-Uncertainties in Pandemic & preparing ourselves for future prospects

 - Session 6-Yala Jivan Aise Nav.
- International Women's Day was celebrated with felicitation of successful women in their respective fields every year.
- Organic Manure preparation workshop was held by the students for the farmers.
- On the occasion of World Blind Day –distribution of clothes was done at Kannubhai Vora Andh Mahavidyalaya, Akola on 15th October 2018.
- Special NSS camps were held at the nearby villages for seven days every year to inculcate social sensibility among the students.
- The institution contributed in the Matoshri Annapurna Yojana for providing food for needy patient and their relatives every year.
- Students participated in

 - AIDS Awareness Campaign
 - Rescue at Fire Affected Area
 - Cleanliness of Morna River
 - Eco Friendly Ganesh Idol Preparation and distribution
 - Awareness Campaign on Ban of Plastic Use

 - COVID 19 Vaccination Drive

Evidence of Success:

A sense of social responsibility is cultivated and nurtured in students. All the students of institute and NSS / NCC units, Nature club, Departmental associations, study centres regularly worked with Government, Non-Government Organisations and society. Community engagements enriched the overall experiences of the students. Learning experience was gained by working with differently abled people and improved sense of community responsibility. Communication skill development, social responsibility, willingness to serve the society, helping nature, ability to understand the problems of common man, ability to face the natural calamities, leadership skill, connecting to people and enabling volunteerism are the outcome of the practice. Organisations like Gadge Baba Samajik Prathishthan, Sath Sevak Foundation, Yuvavishva Multipurpose organisation are formed by some of the active students of our institute. Seeds of starting these organisations had been sown during the learning years at the institution and now it has been shaped up into Non-Government Organisations. Through these organisations, the students are working in social field.

The COVID-19 pandemic outreach activities (Corona Warriors) are highly appreciated by State

Government, Police department, Municipal corporation, District collector office, affiliating university and MLA, MP. The Cleanliness drives and Swaccha Bharat Abhiyan programms are duly acknowledged by various prestigious awards. A feeling of happiness derived from the gesture of Love, Smile and Hope during the visit and work at old age home, tribal areas, COVID-19 affected victims and differently abled people are beyond words.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required to Implement the Practice:

Sometimes, student participation is difficult due to the academic schedules. Parents are not willing to send their wards to participate in social emersion. Passive participation of villagers and local representatives, lack of awareness and misconception about the Governments welfare schemes are major hurdles in organizing students outreach activities.

To arrange outreach activities, sufficient financial aids are required. These activities are mainly carried out by the Institution's funds and contribution from the teachers. Financial contribution from the students is difficult because most of the students are belonging to economically weaker section. The inadequate funds are major obstacles particularly to conduct skill based training activities. Building trust and relationships is sometimes difficult if the group is approached for first time.

Financial resources, people's cooperation, positive approach of public representative, parents willingness, social awareness, involvement of the Government authorities, proper implementation of Government social welfare scheme are required to organize proper outreach activities.

Note

In today's global scenario of the virtual world of communication, the adolescence is learning and growing fast but on the contrary social isolation and loneliness is also reported.

It is rarely seen that families are living together in a joint structure. Children are busy spending their time in their own virtual world or hanging out with friends. Sharing, living together, sacrificing simple things, has become difficult. The major challenge, parents are facing, is teaching the child moral values, preventing children from the excessive use of gadgets, developing social and economic growth.

Community outreach activities help to serve others, built strong character and develop a solid support system, which in turn protects against stress and depression. It also helps to develop the spirit of working together, task management, actually knowing each other, sharing and connecting.

2. Title of the Practice: Entrepreneurship Cell

Objective of the Practice:

The college has an Entrepreneurship Cell with an objective to go beyond the 'Earn while Learn' scheme and to impart innovation and entrepreneurship among students.

To inculcate the values of self-employment through their abilities and skills, the objectives of the practice are-

- 1. To enhance the entrepreneurial spirit.
- 2. To provide entrepreneurial knowledge.
- 3. To provide a platform for inculcating entrepreneurial skills in students.
- 4. To encourage students to get self-employed.
- 5. To organise Entrepreneurship Development Programms and Workshops.
- 6. To motivate the students for participation in start-ups.

The Context:

'Earn while Learn' is a regular Best Practice of our college which was highly appreciated by Peer Team in previous NAAC and suggested to create Entrepreneurship Cell.

In view of NAAC peer team suggestion and need of self-employment, the institute developed Entrepreneurship Cell. In the recent years, employment opportunities are shrinking down, it is the need of the hour to convert small ideas to earn money. Many students are from agriculture background having agricultural resources for self-employment; but the fear of risk stops the students to indulge in entrepreneurship.

It is often observed that students have skills and entrepreneurial abilities, but require polishing and incubation. Creating new products, services and stimulate employment is the aim of Entrepreneurship Cell. In our multi faculty college, Entrepreneurship Cell is a platform made available to students to use freely to explore their capabilities.

The Practice:

The college took the initiative to develop and support the students along with academics to inculcate entrepreneurial initiative in students. The several activities implemented -

- Developed a space for Entrepreneurship Cell.
- Motivated students for college uniform stitching and selling.
- Organized Webinar on "Converting lock down period into golden period-the role of women", by IQAC & Entrepreneurship Cell.
- Students designed and prepared Mask and sold in collaboration with an organization- 'Wawe'
- The Department of Chemistry prepared, distributed and sold sanitizer.
- MoU is signed with Maharashtra Centre for Entrepreneurship Development, Abhyankar group and Rasoi Udyog to strengthen the activity.
- Conducted Bonsai Skill Development Workshops for students by Department of Botany.
- Organized Skill Development Workshop for students of Home Science to empower them with 'Tie and Dye' method of printing for employment.
- Students earned through Food Stalls during various events of the institution regularly.
- Workshop on Entrepreneurship was organized by Faculty of Commerce & Entrepreneurship Cell.

- Department of Zoology organized Webinar on- Sustainable Development with Women Empowerment in Relation to Sericulture & Apiculture.
- Provided an opportunity for marketing of products to self-help group.
- Department of Physics and Electronics involved students in fabrication of low cost Electronic Training Kits.
- 'Re-Tex (Repurposing textiles), An innovative project was undertaken for utilization of textile waste for garments designing by Department of Home Science.
- Preparation and sale of Potted Saplings for programs of the institution by Department of Botany.
- Organic manure preparation workshop was organised by Department of Botany.
- Students participated in Rojgar and Swayam Rojgar Guidance event organised by Police Department.
- Formed Whats app group and Instagram account -E-Cell as online marketing tool.
- Organised guest lectures of eminent entrepreneurs.
- Entrepreneurship Aptitude Test was conducted to explore the entrepreneurial skills in students.
- Visits to Entrepreneurs organisations were arranged.
- Teaching staff are involved in entrepreneurial research practises.
- Organised various skill development workshops on
 - Convocation scarf making
 - Flower arrangement
 - Batik printing
 - Cake making

Evidence of Success:

The students acquired skills of learning by doing. Steps towards developing skills in communication, decision making, networking, time management, team building, presentation, negotiation and social skills were certainly acquired by the students.

Some of students started their own enterprises in Photography, Food Product Order and Delivery Services, Screen Printing and DTP Work, Social Media Influencers, Fashion Designing and Styling, Bakery and Confectionary, Fitness Training and Diet Counselling, Music and Orchestra and many more.

An insight to develop opportunities of self-employment with the available resources and skills is developed. The pandemic situation opened avenues to prepare and market masks and sanitizers. Online platform could be used for organizing Webinars and Workshops.

The Entrepreneurship Cell is now extended to a food court outlet and developed into a mall like structure.

Problems Encountered and Resources required to implement the Practice:

Choosing a right product or service is the main challenge. Initial funding, financial resources, risk bearing and marketing are yet another issues faced by the students. Moreover, to build trust among students takes time. Getting and staying organized, determination and learning, balancing the schedule including marketing and sales activities are a constraint among the students.

The efficient utilization of the human resources such as-ability, skills, interest, energy, knowledge, attitude and non -human resources like-product, money, space, facilities is a challenge for achieving the desired goal.

Note

Entrepreneurship cell: - Need of the hour.

In the global scenario, it is seen that Indian entrepreneurs are doing well and not only helping themselves but also creating jobs in the market.

The rising unemployment rate in India has resulted in growing frustration among youth. In addition, there is always a problem of under employment.

As a result, increasing the entrepreneurial activities in the country is the only solace. Teachers can play a crucial role in developing entrepreneurial spirit in student at the very appropriate age.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

The institute has been always taking efforts to achieve newer heights to fulfil the vision. Prioritising ways for attaining the mission of imparting quality education and providing facilities for acquisition of knowledge to all the strata of the society are the objectives of all the stakeholders. We have amalgamated maximum facilities and programmes under one roof.

Starting with few basic courses at undergraduate level, now the institute has four undergraduate programmes in the Faculty of Humanities, Commerce and Management, Science and Technology and Home Science.

Similarly, there are Twenty One Postgraduate programmes in the Faculty of Humanities,

Commerce and Management, Science and Technology and Home Science, while Five new PG Programms in Hindi, History, Statistics, Electronics and Herbal Science are sanctioned for the next academic session. The Department of Geoinformatics is the only department in Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University, Amravati which offers Master's Degree. Twenty One Career Oriented and skill development programmes are introduced at under graduate level.

In order to foster a research environment, the institute has Fifteen recognized Research Centres and Laboratories for Ph.D. programmes in the Faculty of Science and Technology; Faculty of Interdisciplinary Studies; Faculty of Commerce & Management; and Faculty of Humanities. The research carried out is community based preferably on issues of the vicinity.

Similarly, the institute has a centre of Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University, Nashik, (YCMOU, Nashik) which runs distance learning programme in B.A., B.Com., MBA, MA- Marathi, M.Com, M.Sc. in Mathematics for the students.

What makes our college distinctive is that this college has maximum opportunities of learning through almost all courses from under graduation to research with maximum facilities and infrastructure.

College is conferred with CPE (College with Potential for Excellence) status by UGC, DST FIST support from Department of Science and Technology, Government of India, Lead College status by Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University, Amravati. Among the four centres sanctioned by Rashtriya Ucchatar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA) for Inclusive education, ours is one of the affiliated institute, other three are universities. It is a pilot project in the state which is well equipped with digital assistive technology. This centre has gained the objectives of inclusion of differently abled students into main stream education, by the provision of computer and assistive technology training, reading, listening and writing facilities, organizing outreach programmes etc.

The institute has established Mahatma Gandhi Study Centre, Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru Study Centre, Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Study Centre for value education.

College, being a prominent educational institute, is well prepared to meet the challenges of a rapidly changing techno savvy world. The primary focus of institute is on excellence in core mission activities of teaching, secular approach, conscious efforts to promote values, inclusiveness of all diversities, extension and outreach activities, practically focused quality learning experience empowering students by providing them with all possible opportunities in various fields, wide range of extension activities through NSS and NCC units, Lifelong learning through Government and Non-Government organizations, old age home, orphanages, farms etc. Experiential learning methods are intensively used.

The Department of sports has mentored number of students for the performance of sports activities which has shown extra ordinary talents and brought laurels to the institute.
